PRESIDENT'S COMMENTS

I thought we had a rather nice and successful first meeting on Jan. 10th. There were about 42 people there and this audience was very interested and attentive. Our founder, Tony Walters, told us of his latest compilation of collection data and left a positive message of the need to expand our data base. He showed how most of the collection data is from the Central Willamette Valley, namely Linn and Benton counties. (I will have more to say about this a little later--stay tuned, please.)

Dr. James Trappe gave an excellent slide talk on the field identification of certain truffles. New officers were introduced and Vern Moore tells me that we signed up some new members. After the meeting an informal talk session followed during which we met many visitors and enjoyed the cookies and cake provided by Pat Rawlinson and Henry Pavelek. The coffee and tea were great, too.

Steve Morgan ably described our foray of Jan. 4th to the Paul Bishop Tree Farm and the Grouse Hollow Tree Farm of Howard Hopkins. We were moderately successful in finding a variety of nice truffles. Paul Bishop was a gracious host and was most entertaining with stories of the history of the farm. Dan Wheeler left a copy of the Oregonian article written by reporter David Harlan who accompanied us on this foray. I thought Vern Moore, our personable membership chairman, had the most fun of all and really seemed to enjoy the day immensely. It was fun!

Now, back to how to expand our data base: we need to find people in our membership who would be willing to head up a local group - say in the Coos Bay area, the upper Willamette Valley, the lower W. Valley, Columbia and Clatsop counties, Hood River, The Dalles, the Columbia Gorge Mt. Hood area, the Klamath Basin, Eastern Oregon, just to name a few. The exact geographic areas could be determined later by Tony Walters.

The most important thing now is to find these volunteers and get the requisite information to these people; teaching them how to organize and carry out a foray complete with information in filling out the data cards, care of specimens, and how to mail them to Dr. Trappe.

We here in NATS home base could assist these people. One or more of us could meet them in their location and do this in part of a day. The local groups could contact the land managers of possible foray sites to gain permission to foray and gather truffles, and they could inform the land managers of what was found on the land after the truffle I.D.'s were returned by Dr. Trappe. Once the group learned the procedures they could organize, carry out and report on several forays of their choosing during the year. In this way we could involve more people in the fun of forays, and add a great deal of information to our data base.

I would urge any volunteers to write me so that we can make arrangements to assist you in how forays can be done. If there are no volunteers we will resort to some arm twisting and pleading!! Let's hope we get several offers soon, it will help our cause so very much.

COMMENTS FROM TRAPPE

Tuber monticola Harkn., collected by Dan Wheeler, 12/29/85, is RARE.

Barssia oregonensis Gilkey, collected by Janet Lindgren, Henry Pavalek and Pat Rawlinson, 1/04/86, is probably the earliest in the year collection on record.

Hymenogaster parksii Zeller & Dodge, collected by Vernon Moore, 1/10/86, is part of a collection to be sent to Polytechnic Institute of Ciudad Victoria, Mexico, for their herbarium.

Zelleromyces gilkeyae Sing. & Smith, collected by Vernon Moore, 1/10/86, is an exceptionally large specimen.

Genea intermedia Gilkey, collected by Dan Wheeler, 1/12/86, is possibly the earliest in the year collection to date.

OUR LARGEST RHIZOPOGON SO FAR

From ARKANSAS FUNGI, the newsletter for the Arkansas Mycological Soc., and Edith Nelson, Editor and NATS member.

"November is a good month in Arkansas for "false truffles," and Jay Justice (AMS President) has been busy collecting them around his area. One of his specimens is the largest Rhizopogon rubescens recorded by AMS so far. It weighed 2.1 ounces, and was 3" x 1 1/2", a potato-like shape. Edith experimented, cooking some of Jay's finds, and reports: sauteed 4-5 minutes, the slices were

tender but cooked longer they became and tasted somewhat like fried potatoes, losing the mushroomy flavor. R. rubescens has a whitish peridium which bruises and bleeds a blood-red juice."

Also from Edith comes this question: "Have you all tried cooking these things in a microwave oven?"

And: "An ex-botany teacher in AMS says she microwaves specimens to kill the bugs, for her herbarium."

Thank you, Edith, for your contributions.

CULINARY CORNER

Truffled Cheese

Submitted by Mike Wells

$\frac{1}{2}$ lb. medium sharp Tillamook cheese,
cut into two chunks
2 Tuber gibbosum, thumbnail size,
plus 2-4 smaller ones

Place the cheese and the truffles
in a one quart size zip-loc bag
and close tightly. Leave out at a
cool room temperature for 24-36
hours.

The cheese will be well inoculated
with the truffle flavor, and you
still have the truffles to flavor
more cheese, or use in another way.

Mike is experimenting with smoking
the truffled cheese at 80 degrees.
We will be anxious to hear how this
experiment worked.

Truffles

Submitted by Norene Wedam

Combine: 1 part grated truffle
1 part softened butter
2 parts cream cheese

Form small balls. Dredge in rubbed
parsley or finely chopped walnuts.

The following recipes are taken from
OLD POLISH TRADITIONS IN THE KITCHEN
AND AT THE TABLE, and adapted by
Norene Wedam to suit the Wedam's
preferences.

Hot Boletus Snack

Trim caps. Pour cold milk over fine,
not too large boletus caps (three
caps per person), so that mushrooms
are barely covered. Leave over-
night. The next day, add a little
water and cook gently until mush-
rooms are soft. Drain and cool.
Lightly salt and pepper. Dip in
flour, beaten egg and finely sifted
breadcrumbs. Fry in butter on both
sides until browned. Serve in the

pan, garnished with parsley sprigs.
This is an old Polish snack served
with dry Polish vodkas.

Salad Dressing

Combine the following, to taste:

Sour cream
Lemon juice
sugar

Salt (Pepper, if you choose)
Blend well with a whisk. Add grated
truffle. Chill for several hours
before use. Pour over a delicate
leaf lettuce salad such as Black
Seeded Simpson or Red Sails Lettuce.
Garnish with quartered hard boiled
eggs and any of the following:
black olives, tomato wedges, tuna.

Cabbage With Truffle and Croutons

Rinse and drain sauerkraut or use
fresh shredded, cooked cabbage.
Make a white sauce, season to taste,
and combine with cabbage. Heat
through. Add finely minced truffle,
just before serving, and heat until
aroma is released. Put in serving
dish and top with a little mild
shredded cheese and a few croutons.

Truffle Omelet, a la Queen Sobieski

This a dish for company.

Use two or three frying pans of
approximately equal size. For each
omelet, beat four eggs with 1T plain
yogurt and cook in lightly browned
butter. One teaspoon parsley may
be added to each omelet if desired.

Saute minced truffles in already
slightly browned butter, remove
from the stove and quickly whisk in
2-3 T sour cream, or sweet cream.
The cream should first be well blend-
ed with a bit of flour to resist
separation.

Pour the truffle butter between
omelets which are stacked like a
cake. Top with 1 T Parmesan cheese
and more truffle butter. Put in
oven until lightly browned on top.
Cut in wedges and serve.

Highlights of Activities

Membership Growth from 193 in 1984 to 213 in 1985.

Held 15 organized forays in 1985.

Set up and manned three very successful truffle exhibits:

May 16-19, 1985 - Douglas County Family Forestry Expo

October 12, 1985 - Fall City Mushroom Festival

October 20, 1985 - OMS Mushroom Show

In 1985, we had 625 truffle collections involving 43 genera and 76 species. This included seven(7) new finds.

Our truffle collections, to date, number over 3000, involving over 300 species. Most of our collection data has been entered into a computer.

An outstanding informative newsletter is being provided to all of our members to keep them informed of current developments and finds.

A slide set has been developed covering the same subjects included in the photo packet, plus five(5) additional slides. These are available to members at cost.

Our library has been expanded by 97 references to a total of 500.

We have added 24 new recipes to our collection.

The annual potluck and awards banquet was the best yet from the stand point of a good meeting place, congenial atmosphere, but most of all from the standpoint of the greatest variety of dishes and the best flavored gourmet food.
